

IFAC ACTIVITY FUND SUPPORT APPLICATION FORM

The IFAC Activity Fund invites authors who have submitted papers to CCA2021 to apply for support. Successful applicants on university staff will receive a bursary of €900, and successful student applications will receive €750.

A person is eligible for support if all of the following criteria are met:

- The person must be an author of a technical paper that has been accepted at CCA2021.
- The person must not be a citizen of a high income country and must not be supported by any institution in a high income country. A list of high income countries follows as an appendix.

PLEASE NOTE

- Bursary funding is provided by the IFAC Activity Fund. A limited number of applications can be supported.
- Submission of an application represents no guarantee that funding will be given.
- Only one author per paper can be supported.
- Recipients must register in advance for the congress; however, registration fees will be waived. All travel, accommodation visa and insurance costs remain the responsibility of the recipient.
- Presentation of the paper at the congress by the successful applicant is a requisite for support.
- Recipients must write a short report stating what the attendance meant to them, and what they learnt. Applying for the award implies that the recipients give their consent that the report together with their picture and a brief bio will be uploaded on any IFAC website.
